The Problems in Arkansas

911 service suffers from lack of funds.
911 service is operating with outdated equipment/technology.
911 service is inefficiently organized.
Emergency response times vary throughout the state.
Rural areas lack broadband.
First responders cannot communicate with one another easily.

The Solution The Arkansas Public Safety Act

- New technology and infrastructure to meet the needs of 21st-century population.
- Reorganize the Emergency Telephone Services Board into the Arkansas 911 Board to oversee and set standards for PSAPs.
- Reduce the number of PSAPs in the state from 127 to 77, allowing PSAPs to function more efficiently.

- Repeal 3 fees: local 911 tariffs, Arkansas universal service charge, and emergency telephone service charge.
- Establish one transparent fee, the public safety connectivity charge of \$2.25, to be uniform on all landline and cell phone bills.
- These reforms will help generate an additional \$18 million for 911, \$12 million for Arkansas Wireless Information Network, and \$8 million for broadband.

- Average decrease of 32 cents on landline phone bills and average increase of 47 cents on cell phone bills.
- Expand broadband to rural areas, which will assist in the shift to Next Generation 911 services.
- Provide funding for upgrades/maintenance of Arkansas Wireless Information Network so first responders can communicate efficiently and effectively.
